## SUNDAY, MARCH 26, 2017: FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT



Dear Parishioners,

Recently, the news has carelessly discussed the possibility of "married priests", again. Pope Francis mentioned it in an interview and the usual round of speculations followed. It seems to me, therefore, opportune to clarify this rather complex matter as it is well beyond the expertise of most journalists, and open to extreme confusions.

First, one must clarify the term, "married priests", which is infelicitous for many reasons. The noun, priest, is clear enough a man who has validly received the Sacrament of Holy Order of the priesthood (as opposed to the diaconate). Priests serve as pastors or their assistants, parochial vicars, or in special ministries, such as teaching. Priests are men of the Eucharist, first and foremost, who, with proper delegation from their ordinaries, i.e., bishops or religious superiors, may also absolve from sin and preach. In extraordinary circumstances, priests have ordained other priests, although this is not the ordinary practice of the Church.

Historically, a man who was called to the priesthood -- whether single (celibate) or married -- was expected to observe continence, that is, abstinence from sexual relations. In the case of a single man, this was nothing other than the chastity or self-mastery expected of any single Christian, male or female.

For a married man, however, this entailed the renunciation of his conjugal rights to intimacy with his wife (of course, he never had a right to sexual intimacy with any other person, which is called adultery). Marriage, therefore, did not constitute a meaningful difference for priests since they were all expected to observe continence.

Ordained married men, who continued to share a common life with their wives, could find this rather challenging (as could their wives). It became desirable, therefore, to avoid this situation altogether by the practice of only ordaining unmarried, i.e., celibate men to the priesthood.

We should note immediately, however, that even though married men were indeed ordained to the priesthood -- some of whom are canonized saints -- priests **never** married. The priesthood -- both priests and bishops -- were always understood in some real way to be married to the Church, as Christ married His Bride, the Church, cf. Ephesians 5:21-33, etc..

Clerical celibacy is today the universal practice of the Catholic Church in its Latin branches with notable exceptions; in its Eastern branches, the practices developed differently. In the Latin branches of the Catholic Church, exceptions have been granted for specific groups or individuals throughout the centuries. Often, these were or are former Protestant clergymen. These exceptions, however, were always personal and never set any precedent. Consequently, one may correctly respond that there have almost always been "married priests" in the Catholic Church, even in the Latin branch; of course there always have been in the Eastern Catholic Churches as well.

We will continue next week with further reflection.

Cari parrocchiani,

Recentemente, la notizia ha incautamente discusso la possibilità di "sacerdoti sposati", di nuovo. Papa Francesco ne ha parlato in una intervista e il solito giro di speculazioni ha seguito. Mi sembra, quindi, opportuno chiarire la questione piuttosto complessa in quanto è ben oltre la competenza della maggior parte dei giornalisti, e aperta a confusioni estreme.

Innanzitutto, si deve chiarire il termine, "sacerdoti sposati", che è infelice per molte ragioni. Il sostantivo, prete o sacerdote, è chiaro: un uomo che ha validamente ricevuto il sacramento della Santa ordine del sacerdozio (in contrapposizione al diaconato). Sacerdoti servono come parroci o dei loro assistenti, vicari parrocchiali, o nei ministeri speciali, per esempio, l'insegnamento. I sacerdoti sono uomini dell'Eucaristia, in primo luogo; con la delegazione dai loro ordinari, vale a dire, vescovi o superiori religiosi, possono anche assolvere dal peccato e predicare. In circostanze straordinarie, i sacerdoti hanno ordinato altri sacerdoti, anche se questo non è la pratica ordinaria della Chiesa.

Storicamente, un uomo che è stato chiamato al sacerdozio - sia singola (celibe) o sposato - era previsto di osservare la continenza, cioè l'astinenza dai rapporti sessuali. Nel caso di un uomo celibe, questo non era altro che la castità o la padronanza di sé atteso di ogni singolo cristiano, maschio o femmina.

Per un uomo sposato, tuttavia, ciò ha richiesto la rinuncia dei suoi diritti coniugali all'intimità con la moglie (ovviamente, non ha mai avuto il diritto di intimità sessuale con qualsiasi altra persona, che si chiama l'adulterio). Il matrimonio, quindi, non costituisce una differenza significativa per i sacerdoti da quando sono stati tutti tenuti ad osservare la continenza.

"Prete sposati", che hanno continuato a condividere una vita comune con le loro mogli, potrebbero trovarla piuttosto impegnativo (come potrebbe le loro mogli). Divenne pertanto auspicabile, per evitare questa situazione. Quindi, la pratica della ordinazione di uomini non sposati, cioè uomini celibi, al sacerdozio divenne la pratica esclusiva.

Dobbiamo notare subito, tuttavia, che anche se gli uomini sposati sono stati infatti ordinati sacerdoti - alcuni dei quali sono canonizzati santi - i sacerdoti non hanno mai sposato. Il sacerdozio - sacerdoti e vescovi - sono stati sempre inteso in qualche modo reale per essere sposata alla Chiesa, come Cristo ha sposato la sua Sposa, la Chiesa, cf. Efesini 5: 21-33, ecc ..

Il celibato sacerdotale è oggi la pratica universale della Chiesa cattolica nei suoi rami latini con notevoli eccezioni; fra i suoi rami orientali, la pratica si è sviluppata diversamente. Nei rami latini della Chiesa cattolica, le eccezioni sono state concesse per gruppi o individui specifici nel corso dei secoli. Spesso, questi sono stati o sono ex pastori protestanti. Queste eccezioni, tuttavia, erano sempre personali e mai impostare un precedente. Di conseguenza, uno può correttamente rispondere che ci sono quasi sempre stati "sacerdoti sposati" nella Chiesa cattolica, anche nel ramo latina; Naturalmente ci sono sempre stati nelle Chiese orientali cattoliche pure.

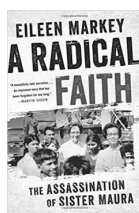

- April 11th - NO CLASS - Easter Recess



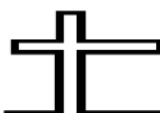

## Music Notes

A word from our Music Director



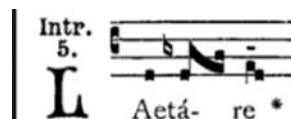
Last week we discussed the relationship of music to transfiguration, illustrated how sacred music allows us a glimpse of divine reality. This week, as promised, we'll delve more deeply into the significance of mountains.

In Holy Scripture, there are hundreds of references to hills and mountains, not only as physical landscape, but as locations where key events occur. On Mount Sinai, God gives Moses the Ten Commandments, and Christ delivers his Sermon on the Mount. Abraham goes up a mountain to sacrifice Isaac, his only son, and on Mount Calvary, Christ fulfills the New Covenant. One easily perceives a pattern: mountains represent high points (pun intended) in our salvation history. The physical closeness of mountains to the sky (as we perceive them), symbolizes a spiritual closeness to heaven. At these high points in our own lives, we can experience a foretaste of heaven.

Of course, the journey up these mountains, the space between these high points, is often rocky, thorny, and sweaty. Christ did not float up to Calvary on the clouds, but carried His Cross. He asks us, especially during the season of Lent, to unite our hearts with His painful journey.

Yet God knows that we need to know for what goal we are striving. The Way of the Cross with no destination would be meaningless. We need those mountaintops, those foretastes of heaven, to remind us of the glorious life that awaits us if we persevere. Sacred music, as we emphasized in the past two weeks, give us this foretaste.

This coming Sunday, we celebrate Laetare Sunday, the "joyful" Sunday, when the purple vestments of Lent are tempered with the white vestments of Easter to create a beautiful rosy hue. The Church in her wisdom gives us this week a momentary reminder of the goal to which our Lenten journey is directed: Easter Sunday and the Resurrection. I'd like to close this week with an image of the very first word of the Introit for Laetare Sunday. Do you see the mountain?

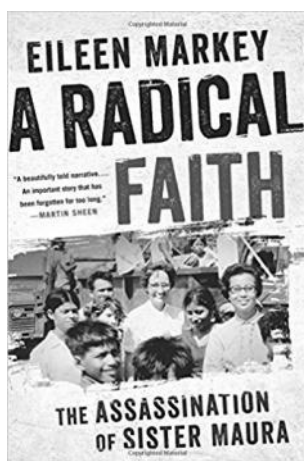

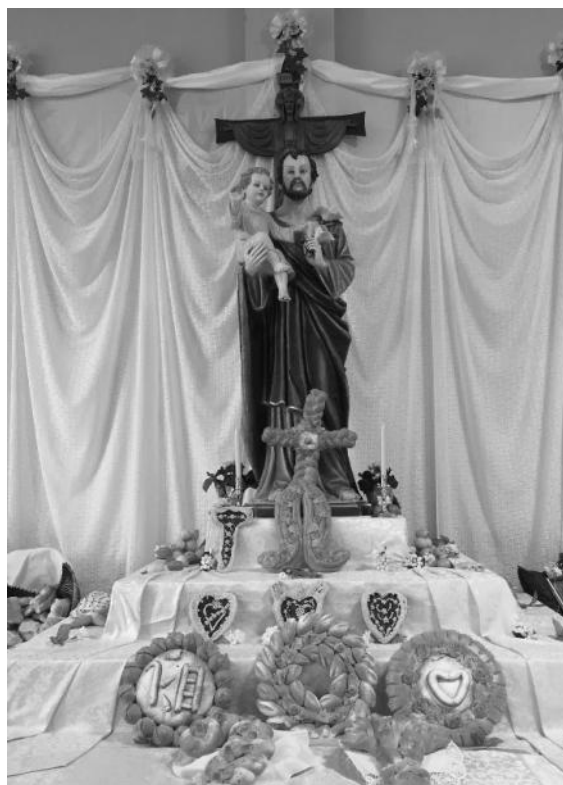
