SUNDAY, APRIL 2, 2017: FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT



Dear Parishioners,

(Part 2) According to various media, Pope Francis is weighing the prospect of "married clergy" in Amazonia, that is, mission territory in Brazil. The question remains, however, regarding clerical continence. How does it apply? Let's imagine, for a moment, that clerical continence is mitigated, namely, that married priests may continue to use their conjugal rights. One must imagine, if the clerical couple is young and fertile, that they should therefore enjoy many children. Why? Although it may be forgotten, the first commandment that God gave to the human race, "be fruitful and multiply" (Gn. 1:28), has never been rescinded. **Never**

So even if many Catholics do not observe the constant teaching of the Church on marital chastity, one should expect that at least the priest and his wife would, lest they wish to lead a life in bad faith, namely, representing the Church in public, but in private mocking its teachings. This is an existentially and morally untenable position for a human being. In fact, it is well documented that the failure of the Protestant denominations to maintain the universal, orthodox Christian teaching on marital chastity and fertility was a direct result of this incoherence. Since the clergy no longer wished to live according to this Christian moral practice, these denominations changed their doctrine on contraception for married couples (and the rest is history!).

In contrast, the Catholic Church has maintained this biblical and apostolic teachings on human sexuality -- despite enormous pressure -- even while demonstrating tremendous mercy to those who have not always conducted their lives accordingly. In this, the Church has faithfully handed on the truth to every generation, even while she lovingly healing those broken by sin and educated all who will listen about the great heights to which human beings can ascend as communities and individuals, if we place our faith in God and allow His grace to transform us.

Without faith, none of this makes any sense. For this reason, one can hardly blame non-Christians for not appreciating the reasons for celibate and marital chastity. Nor should one be surprised that these teachings are a stumbling block to those who have do not understand their place within the larger mystery of God's plan of salvation for humanity.

For this reason, whenever the question of diminishing or abolishing clerical celibacy comes up historically, we often see this tendency with movements that have wished to harm the Church, e.g., the French Revolution, or that wished to make the Church submissive to the state, Lutheranism, Anglicanism, etc. In Church circles, this idea is often proposed for strictly utilitarian or practical reasons, e.g., we will have more priests, priests should enjoy marital bliss, or even more bizarrely, priestly genes should be passed onto the next generations (a suggestion from Fr Richard McBrien from some years ago)! To all of these claims, one can at best say: maybe. But let's look at this more closely next week.

Cari parrocchiani,

Secondo diversi media, Papa Francesco pesa ora la possibilità di "clero sposato" in Amazzonia, cioè, terra di missione in Brasile. La domanda rimane, tuttavia, per quanto riguarda la continenza clericale. Come si applica? Immaginiamo, per un attimo, che la continenza clericale è mitigata, vale a dire, che i sacerdoti sposati possono continuare ad utilizzare i loro diritti coniugali. Si deve immaginare, se la coppia clericale è giovane e fertile, che dovrebbero quindi godere di molti bambini. Perché? Anche se può essere dimenticato, il primo comandamento che Dio ha dato al genere umano, "Siate fecondi e moltiplicatevi" (Gn. 1,28), non è mai stato revocato. Mai.

Quindi, anche se molti cattolici non osservano il costante insegnamento della Chiesa sulla castità coniugale, ci si dovrebbe aspettare che almeno il prete e la moglie avrebbero osservarlo, perché non desiderano condurre una vita in mala fede, vale a dire, in rappresentanza della Chiesa in pubblico, ma in privato beffardo suoi insegnamenti. Questa è una posizione esistenziale e moralmente insostenibile per un essere umano. In realtà, è ben documentato che il fallimento delle denominazioni protestanti per mantenere l'universale, ortodossa dottrina cristiana sulla castità coniugale e della fertilità è stato un risultato diretto di questa incoerenza. Dal momento che il clero non è più voluto vivere secondo questa pratica morale cristiana, queste denominazioni cambiato la loro dottrina sulla contraccezione per le coppie sposate (e il resto è storia!).

Al contrario, la Chiesa cattolica ha mantenuto quest'insegnamento biblico e apostolico sulla sessualità umana - nonostante le enormi pressioni - anche dimostrando enorme misericordia a coloro che non hanno sempre condotto la propria vita di conseguenza. In questo, la Chiesa ha trasmesso fedelmente la verità a ogni generazione, anche mentre si guarisce con amore quelli rotti dal peccato ed educa tutti coloro che vorranno ascoltare sulle grandi altezze a cui gli esseri umani possono ascendere come comunità e come individui, a condizione che poniamo la nostra fede in Dio e permettiamo la sua grazia di trasformarci.

Senza la fede, tutto questo non ha alcun senso. Per questo motivo, difficilmente si può dare la colpa non cristiani per non apprezzare le ragioni della castità e la castità coniugale. Né si dovrebbe essere sorpreso dal fatto che questi insegnamenti sono un ostacolo per coloro che hanno non capiscono il loro posto all'interno del più ampio mistero del disegno di salvezza per l'umanità di Dio.

Per questo motivo, ogni volta che la domanda di diminuire o abolire il celibato clericale esce storicamente, spesso vediamo questo punto di vista associata ai movimenti che hanno voluto danneggiare la Chiesa, ad esempio, la rivoluzione francese, o volevano fare la Chiesa sottomesso allo Stato, il luteranesimo, l'anglicanesimo, ecc.. Negli ambienti della Chiesa, questa idea è spesso proposta per ragioni strettamente utilitaristici o pratici, ad esempio, avremo più preti, preti dovrebbero godere di felicità coniugale, o anche di più stranamente, dovrebbero essere passato geni sacerdotali sulle prossime generazioni (un suggerimento da P. Richard McBrien da alcuni anni fa)! Per tutte queste affermazioni, si può dire nella migliore delle ipotesi: forse. Ma diamo un'occhiata a questa settimana più da vicino la prossima.

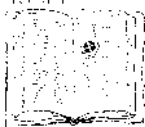

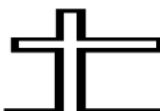

Music Notes



A word from our Music Director



Any good musician knows that silence, or rests, is a key element of any piece of music. Without rests, even the best composers would create mere cacophony: jumbled sound with no clarity. Silence in music, in fact, gives meaning and power to the notes. Even on a practical level, rests or pauses are important, especially for singers and wind instruments, because they are opportunities to take a breath. Silence is also vital to our own well-being and the growth of our relationships. Unfortunately, our modern world, where television, radio, the Internet, and hectic lifestyles provide constant aural and visual stimulation, is not conducive to the practice of silence. In this chaotic noise, words begin to lose their meaning and communication breaks down. In an address for the 46th World Communication Day, Pope Benedict XVI remarked: "In silence, we are better able to listen to and understand ourselves; ideas come to birth and acquire depth; we understand with greater clarity what it is we want to say and what we expect from others; and we choose how to express ourselves." In human relationships, silence is a sign of deep communion between persons; one may often notice a long-married couple who is simply content to "be" with one another, not requiring any words to express their love. So too in our relationship with God. When we can simply "be still and know" God, we enter into a deeply intimate relationship with Him, one that mirrors the eternal contemplation of heaven.

We understand that sacred music is intended to give us a foretaste, even briefly, of our heavenly experience. Therefore, good sacred music must be related to silence, as the experience of most intimate union with God. In fact, what sets sacred music apart from other styles is precisely its call to silence. An opera aria evokes a standing ovation, a rock concert evokes thunderous screams, and a dance hall evokes the hum and laughter of a crowd. Sacred music, however, if it is to achieve its purpose, must evoke silence. It is neither performance nor entertainment, but is intended to guide us to wondering contemplation of the heavenly mysteries.
